#### From the Vicar.

One of my favourite poems from schooldays (a long, long time ago now......) was "Ode to Autumn" by John Keats, whose opening line "Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness" is so evocative. Gathering apples in the Vicarage garden for the Harvest Services and looking out from the height of the Churchyard over low lying early morning mist bring Keat's wonderful poem to my mind each autumn, and never fails to remind me of God's presence with us in and through creation. The passages we have read at our Harvest Services, from the Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament, make clear our responsibilities at this time of the year – to give thanks to God for the many and varied fruits of creation, and to remember those less fortunate than ourselves. These are spiritual and practical responsibilities which we as individual Christians, and as members of Christ's body on earth, the Church, should always take seriously, but also joyfully.

Autumn is of course a time of change, which we see most dramatically and beautifully in the natural world around us, and in the calendar and festivals of the Church. The festivals of All Saints and All Souls, Remembrance Sunday and others draw us on towards our celebration of Christ the King and the beginning of the season of Advent. There is, in these coming weeks, much to remember and give thanks for, and much to celebrate, even if we have gradually less daylight in which to do this!

The theme of this year's National Poetry Day was "counting", and I strongly resisted the temptation to write something along the lines of "...counting down the days till Christmas", knowing that this will be starting very soon in the worlds of commerce and marketing! Giving thanks to God for the wonders of creation, the fruits of the earth, and all our blessings, and rejoicing in the beauty of autumn, will be counting enough for me in this "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness".

Reading this next article by Robert Steele, made me re-look at the window in the Lady Chapel, what a story it tells once you really observe it!

### The Lady Chapel Window

The Lady Chapel stained glass window of Mary and the Christ Child is one of those "marmite" experiences: the viewer either loves it or hates it.

I often sit opposite it at the 8 o'clock communion service on Sundays and have observed it through the seasons and watched its colours change as the back lighting changes, and with it the mood from dark and sombre to bright, vibrant and dynamic. Careful study shows it to be a very thoughtful and powerful piece of art.

First, a little of its history: it was put in place during the 1960's church restoration, inspired and funded by John L. Snyder who was a wonderful benefactor of the church. It was made by the Whitefriars Glass Company, the leading manufacturer at the time (look for their hooded friar figure in the bottom righthand corner of the window). It was designed by Pierre Fourmaintreaux, their chief designer, a Frenchman who had moved to England. Fourmaintreaux identified his work by adding PF by the hooded friar emblem.

In 1965 this piece of expressionist art was fitted in the church and shortly afterwards that phase of restoration ended because Mr. Snyder died, and the funding stopped.

The window represents Mary and the baby Jesus. As the art critic, Waldemar Januszczak has pointed out, this is an extremely common topic in religious art, but rarely "pulled off." Mary is easy to paint, but how do you represent a babe in arms who is also a member of the eternal Trinity and Saviour of the world? Few artists succeed in achieving this, but I believe that Fourmaintreaux does. The Christ Child spreads his arms to embrace and bless the world. His face remains childlike but serene, wise and determined. His head is framed by a halo which is backed by a cross, a sombre reminder of what was to come.

Mary is clothed in shades of blue, her traditional colour, and holds a lily, a symbol of her purity and calling to bear the Christ Child. The lily is usually found in paintings of the Annunciation when the Angel Gabriel tells her that she will bear the Saviour. Mary's expression is serene, apprehensive and thoughtful. Both figures look directly at the observer; their message and its promise is for each one of us.

Directly above Mary is a dove, the symbol of both the divine presence and the deliverer of peace for the troubled soul. At the top of the picture, the heavens are represented by stars, a fitting background for Mary who has been known since the Middle Ages as the "Queen of Heaven."


Angels are portrayed on each side, worshipping and praising. Each has a different arm and hand gesture representing prayer (hands making a steeple), praise (arms raised), acceptance (arms lowered) and reverence (arms crossed).

It is interesting to note that the surrounding glass creates an oval of curving lines around Mary and Jesus. This is typical of Fourmaintreaux' work where his central subject is framed by the glass.


The other windows in the chapel should not be forgotten, as they provide the frame or environment for the main window.


The Lady Chapel window is really very powerful and worthy of careful study as it is full of symbols, but its overwhelming strength is the majesty and glory it represents.





### People of the New Testament Part 5 – Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10)

Caroline explains what inspired her to write about one of the characters in her new book.

The author Michael Card has called Zacchaeus "a genuinely bad man". And it's true that to have risen to the position of chief tax collector, he is likely to have been particularly corrupt in a system based upon greed and deceitfulness.

The Law demanded that he repay what he had taken plus a fifth, although after his encounter with Christ, he promised to repay four times the amount he had embezzled and to give half his possessions to poor people.

Luke's readers would have been shocked at Zacchaeus' wholehearted repentance. Christ's unconditional love melted this man's heart and turned him completely around. And all these centuries later, Christ's love continues to overwhelm and transform the unlikeliest of people, no matter who they are and what they have done. 👻

Kathryn Fleming reflects on Hebrews 4:12-end and Mark 10:17-31

he word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword," says the reading from Hebrews today.

Ouch - I just cut myself on scripture!

Indeed, I do so whenever I hear Jesus' words to that rich young man, who has somehow become possessed by his own possessions and just can't let go. Perhaps, like me, you'd love to be the kind of person who really does put the kingdom of God before everything else, but who struggles to jettison precious inessentials that we seem to take a lifetime to accumulate. On a good day, perhaps we can sit reasonably lightly to our material possessions, but sitting lightly to our relationships is another matter altogether. The prospect of leaving children, in particular, for Jesus' sake is quite simply impossible for me to contemplate. So, what am I, what are we, to do with these challenging, uncompromising words?

Thankfully, we have two comforts in today's readings.

To quote my son in his teenage years "Jesus gets it." Or, if you prefer the words from Hebrews: "we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathise with our weaknesses". No matter how abject and frequent our failures, Jesus understands the tangled muddle of motivations and longings that shape our actions, and if we can't order our priorities properly ourselves, there's the immeasurable comfort that "for God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26), even when we can't quite let go. 学

Gracious God, when we fail to put you first, when we lean on other things, when we are tempted to give up following altogether, thank you that you understand and love us still. Help us to trust you always. Amen.
