For those of you we haven't yet seen, the Ministry Team wish you all a happy, healthy and blessed New Year.

Good morning to all, and we hope you have managed to get through the snowy and frosty days so far without mishap? The countryside has looked beautiful though in the snow, and it can be so much fun!



Last week we celebrated The Epiphany, the arrival of the three wise men in Bethlehem, where they found a baby in a manger, a baby named Jesus who was destined to be a King. Epiphany marks the end of the 12 days of Christmas. We will however be keeping our Christmas tree up in church until Candlemas on 2nd February as well as the crib.

Services for Sunday 12th January: The Rev Alec Brown 10.30am Plough Service – we will be holding a special service and will go outside during the service to bless the plough. We do this each year, asking God for his blessing on the work of the farmer and farm workers, and for the growing of the new seed when planted: The Rev Christina Westwell is leading the Plough Service at Antrobus St. Marks – 10.30am

Blessing of the Plough

1st Speaker The plough is the foundation of our work and a symbol of our labour:

2nd Speaker For the soil to be broken up and the seed sown, we must first plough the fields.

Speaker For the green corn to grow and ripe grain to be reaped, we must first plough the fields.

1stSpeaker For the bread to be baked and the people fed, we must first plough the fields

2nd Speaker For prosperity to come to our farms and families, we must first plough the fields.

3rd Speaker So we bring this ploughshare here for you to give your blessing upon it and upon all the work done on our farms.

1st Speaker God speed the plough: the plough and the ploughman, the farm and the farmer.

2nd Speaker God speed the plough: the beam and the mouldboard, the slade and the sidecap, the share and the coulters.

3rd Speaker God speed the plough: in fair weather and foul, in rain and wind, in frost and sunshine:

All: God speed the plough!

Plough Sunday

The observance of Plough Sunday on the First Sunday of Epiphany goes back to Victorian times, but behind it there is a much older observance, associated with the first working day after the twelve days of Christmas, hence 'Plough Monday' in some places. In medieval times some ploughs were kept in the parish church, and some churches kept a 'plough-light'. In days when work was scarce in winter, the observance looked forward to the time of sowing with the promise of a harvest to come. Some Christian communities have reintroduced it as a focus for asking a blessing on human labour near the start of the calendar year.

4.00pm Holy Communion Common Worship Today also marks the Baptism of Christ, when Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist in the River Jordan.

Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

15 As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷His winnowing-fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

21 Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, ²²and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

Happy New Year, and very best wishes for 2025 to everyone!

"A cold coming we had of it......" begins T.S. Eliot's famous "Journey of the Magi" and it's a line I'm sure we can all identify with at the very cold start of this new year! We have of course just celebrated the subject matter of Eliot's poem – The Epiphany – and for me the celebration speaks both of place and of dispersion. Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jerusalem, Galilee and Judea are such pivotal places for our Christian story, but we remember too that the three Wise Men or Kings came from far-away places to worship at the manger throne, and then "returned to their own country by another way." And we know that in the decades, and centuries, following Jesus' birth, death and resurrection – to which Eliot refers in the last line of the poem - "I should be glad of another death" – the Christian message was taken far and wide, to the very furthest borders of the known world – place and dispersion.

Over two millennia after the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus we are still involved in, and firmly rooted/grounded in both place and dispersion/mission. There is no doubt whatsoever of the importance of St Mary and All Saints Church, in the heart of our large and ancient parish, for so many people, now and in the past – all parishioners, members of the congregation, visitors and enquirers – and the business of mission, in different forms, occupies us all, in one way or another. And so, as we begin this new year, with all its challenges in so many areas and aspects of our lives, and not least in the Church nationally, may the joy of the shepherds and the Wise Men be with us all in this wonderful season of Epiphany, as we give thanks to God for the revelation of the Messiah amongst us, and as we go about our daily lives.

Lord, you give us times of stillness, and quiet moments of life to remember you and your love. We give you thanks.


Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.



Part 2 – Mary's legacy to mothers

Sr Janet continues her tour of Ephesus.

As well as being a guest at the House of the Virgin Mary in Ephesus, I was also a pilgrim. Regardless of the joy of the resurrection and of being reunited with Jesus, Mary's postresurrection life would always include the horrific memory and image of Calvary. I wanted to bring to Mary all the mothers whom the loss of a child has changed for

ever. She has shared their pain and heartbreak and understands their struggle to rebuild life.

Many Christians are unaware that Muslims regard Jesus as a prophet and hold Mary in such high esteem that she is mentioned five times in the Qur'an. Hence, despite the differences in Christian-Muslim understanding and belief, Jesus and Mary can unite the two religions in the harmony for which both Jesus and Mohammed prayed. It also explains the tangible peace surrounding the shrine broken only by birdsong.

For in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptised into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ."

Georgina Byrne reflects on Isaiah 43:1-7 and Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

o much of who we are, how we present ourselves to the world, is wrapped up in our name. Our name might represent our nationality, our background, it might give away our likely age, or the aspirations of our parents. Some people spend their lives having to spell or explain their name. We grow into our names - some of us change them.

Isaiah 43 reminds us that our name has something to do with our relationship with God. God, the creator, we recall, names things in the beginning of Genesis and they come into being. When Isaiah tells us that God calls us by name, it signifies that God calls us into being and gives us our purpose. God knows who, what and how we truly are. We are God's.

In Luke's version of the baptism of Jesus, God names Jesus "my Son", and in so doing, imbues Jesus' life with a meaning beyond imagining. Jesus is named as God's son, by God, and his whole life's purpose is made known.

Christians often recall their own baptism on this day. The Prayer Book catechism reminds us that our baptism makes us "a member of Christ, the child of God and an inheritor of the kingdom of heaven". Whatever our moniker, God has called us into being for a purpose. We are named, called, and known by God.

Lestyn is my late-born lamb. He's pure black with a tiny white dot in the middle of his forehead and he's my favourite. He is two months younger than the other ram lambs and therefore smaller but full of life... until two days ago, when I found him collapsed in the field. He couldn't walk, he couldn't see very well and he was terrified. I carried him on

my shoulder to the small shed where we keep straw, laid him down and gave him an antibiotic injection and some molasses. The next day I did the same. Each morning I've expected him to be cold and still and each morning I've been wrong.

Hope can feel so distant, yet today he joined his flock mates and began grazing. The God in this, for me, is in the brilliance of the discovery of antibiotics and their preciousness as holy life restorers.
